

This letter responds to your request for advice regarding the campaign reporting provisions of the Political Reform Act (the "Act"). Please note that we base our advice solely on the provisions of the Act.

### QUESTION

Does Section 84602(d), or any other provision of the Act, require the Secretary of State to redact any information in a scanned copy of a Statement of Organization (the "Form 410") before posting it on her website?

### CONCLUSION

Section 84602(d) applies to documents that are required to be electronically filed under the Act's online disclosure requirements in Chapter 4.6 (commencing with Section 84600) of the Act. Since the Secretary of State's proposed website posting concerns paper documents filed under other provisions of the Act, Section 84602(d) is not applicable to those documents and no other provision of the Act requires that information from those documents be redacted. We offer no comment on the requirements, if any, of other laws outside the Act.

### **FACTS**

You are the Chief of the Political Reform Division within the Office of the Secretary of State and request advice in that capacity. Under Section 81008(a), all data filed with the Secretary of State pursuant to the Act is available for viewing and copying in the Office of the Secretary of State.



This includes addresses of all contributors, treasurers and committees, as well as bank account numbers. The information is available in the Sacramento Office of the Secretary of State on paper documents filed with the office and on computer terminals that access a non-internet database. Copies of the information are provided upon request.

Section 84605 defines who files their campaign reports electronically with the Secretary of State. Specifically, those candidates or committees who have received contributions or loans or made expenditures or loans of at least \$50,000 are subject to electronic filing. Thus, if a candidate or committee filed a Form 410 and initially did not have contributions or expenditures at the qualifying arount, they would not file the Form 410 electronically. If a candidate or committee has initial contributions or expenditures of at least \$50,000, they would file their Form 410 online in the first instance. If, however, they became eligible for electronic filing later on (by reaching that \$50,000 threshold), they would amend their Form 410's at that time, and would file electronically.

Section 84602 requires the Secretary of State to make all data filed available on the internet for public access as soon as possible after receipt. Currently, Form 410 is available online only if the filer is subject to electronic filing. You plan to make scanned images of completed Form 410's available on the Secretary of State's website whether the filer filed the form electronically or not. You plan to redact bank account information as well as street address and phone number information of committee treasurers.

#### ANALYSIS

One of the main purposes of the Political Reform Act is to ensure that campaign finances are "fully and truthfully disclosed so that the voters may be fully informed." (Section 81002(a) and (b).) Section 81008 provides the public broad access to reports filed under the Act:

"(a) Every report and statement filed pursuant to this title is a public record open for public inspection and reproduction during regular business hours, commencing as soon as practicable, but in any event not later than the second business day following the day on which it was received . . .."

Your office plans to post on its website scanned images of completed Forms 410 that have been filed in paper form but that are not currently required to be filed with your office electronically. You have asked whether you must redact any information from those forms before you scan a copy and post it on the website. You have stated that you plan to redact, as a matter of policy, bank account number information and street address and telephone information of committee treasurers before posting the scanned images.

Section 84602(d) only applies to documents filed electronically under the Act's online disclosure requirements in Chapter 4.6 (commencing with Section 84600) of the Act. It does not apply to paper documents, including the Form 410, filed with the Secretary of State under other provisions of the Act (see Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 84100) of the Act). Therefore, Section 84602(d) does not require the Secretary of State to redact any information from these documents if she chooses to post them on her official website. Furthermore, no other provision of the Act requires redaction of information from these paper documents. Finally, please note that we offer no advice on provisions outside the Act that may apply to your question. If you have other questions on this matter, please contact me at (916) 322-5660.

SUBJECT: Declaration of Emergency – Replacement of Kirkwood General Stator Core

Gentlepersons:

This memo supersedes previous memo dated September 17, 2008. In accordance with Chapter 6, Article IV, Section 6.60(D) of the Administrative Code of the City and County of San Francisco, I am declaring an emergency on behalf of the Public Utilities Commission.

The Kirkwood Powerhouse (KPH) was constructed in 1967. Generator units KPH1 and KPH2 were in service shortly thereafter. The life span of a generator winding is 30 years. HHWP issued contract HH910 to rewind KPH1 and KPH2 (replace the stator windings only). Upon removal of the stator windings the stator core was inspected. Due to the inconsistencies in the stator core configuration of KPH1, the new windings could not be installed with proper wedging or side packing (the stator core in KPH2 is useable). To have KPH1 available to generate for spring runoff, the stator core must be replaced prior to installing the windings. Without the core being replaced, the rewind on KPH1 cannot be completed. If KPH1 is not rewound and available for spring runoff, there may be a reduction in generation revenues of up to \$3,500,000 (median year, varies by water year type).

It is in the best interest of the City to issue emergency contracts to replace the Kirkwood Generator Stator Core. Work to be performed is beyond the capabilities of City forces. The estimated total cost of the project is \$2,200,000.

I am therefore declaring the existence of an emergency. I trust that this meets with your concurrence and approval.

Conservation Groups Urge Restoration of Coastal Wetlands at Park to Protect San Francisco Garter Snake, California Red-Legged Frog

San Francisco — The Center for Biological Diversity today filed a 60-day notice of intent to sue the City and County of San Francisco for illegally killing and harming two endangered species at Sharp Park Golf Course in Pacifica, in violation of the federal Endangered Species Act. Activities at the golf course have been killing federally protected California red-legged frogs, and recent studies show that ongoing course operations may be threatening endangered San Francisco garter snakes.

"The time is right to restore Sharp Park to its natural condition," said Jeff Miller, a conservation advocate with the Center for Biological Diversity. "San Francisco has a golden opportunity to save taxpayers' money, preserve our endangered species, and improve recreational access to our coast."

The Center is calling on San Francisco to cease harming endangered species, restore Sharp Park to its natural state as a coastal wetland, and provide more diverse recreational opportunities for the public at the site. The Center opposes a flawed plan released recently by San Francisco's Recreation and Park Department that calls for privatizing the mismanaged and financially failing golf course and illegally reconstructing flooded portions of the course at the expense of endangered species.

The operation and mismanagement of the golf course is undermining habitat-restoration work within the nearby Golden Gate National Recreation Area for the garter snake and the frog at adjacent Mori Point. In 2005, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service notified the Recreation and Park Department that golf course operations were illegally "taking" threatened California red-legged frogs (*Rana aurora draytonii*) by draining and pumping the frog's aquatic habitats, which strands and desiccates frog eggs and kills tadpoles. New evidence has surfaced that extremely rare San Francisco garter snakes (*Thamnophis sirtalis tetrataenia*) have been killed by groundskeepers mowing grass in areas that the snake uses for basking.

Sharp Park Golf Course is owned by the City and County of San Francisco but is located to the south of the city on the coast, in Pacifica. Its ongoing environmental problems are largely due to poor design and unfortunate placement. To create the course in the early 1930s, the Recreation and Park Department dredged and filled areas around a lagoon known as Laguna Salada for 14 months. Not surprisingly, Sharp

Park has had problems with flooding and drainage ever since. The course's ceremonial opening day was delayed twice due to wet playing conditions, major coastal floods have on two occasions destroyed several holes, and normal winter rains flood the course nearly every year.

"Sharp Park is built over lagoon wetlands and will always lack proper natural drainage and require extravagant effort to maintain," said Peter Baye, a coastal ecologist who prepared lagoon-wetland restoration plans for California State Parks and the National Recreation Area. "Maintaining a drowning golf course as sea levels rise is a futile investment. Restoring flood outlets and expanding marsh areas would improve endangered species habitat and increase flood-control options for adjacent landowners."

San francisco is reviewing all of its municipally owned golf courses to map out their future use. The Center for Biological Diversity has proposed restoring Sharp Park to a natural state and providing access to hiking trails, publicking spots, camping facilities and educational opportunities – all of which are sorely needed in San Mateo County.

The Recreation and Park Department, on the other hand, in August released a fatally flawed <u>consultant's report</u> that advocates privatizing San Francisco's public golf courses and reconstructing Sharp Park as an "elite" golf course with all 18 holes west of Highway 1. The plan's recommendations would destroy and fragment much of the snake and frog habitat on the site. It would make flood problems significantly worse, create legal liability to San Francisco for flood damage to adjacent properties, and involve time-consuming permit processes for development that will never be allowed by state and federal regulatory agencies.

"This habitat destruction plan is a non-starter, and if pursued further by the Recreation and Park Department will result in a costly lawsuit for San Francisco," Miller said. "It is untenable on economic, flood management, and ecological grounds and imposes huge financial and legal risks to the City and County of San Francisco and its taxpayers."

"Sharp Park is a critical link in the chain of endangered species habitats on the central coast," said Peter Brastow, director of Nature in the City, a local conservation group. "A restored Sharp Park ecosystem would seamlessly integrate into the surrounding National Park landscape and could be showcased as a natural area where children and adults can connect with wild nature in their own backyard."

The Center for Biological Diversity, Sierra Club San Francisco Bay and Loma Prieta chapters, San Francisco League of Conservation Voters, Nature In The City, and Golden Gate Audubon Society all have called on San Francisco to consider restoration of coastal wetlands and endangered species habitat at Sharp Park.

### Background on Endangered Species

The San Francisco garter snake (*Thamnophis sirtalis tetrataenia*) has been dubbed "the most beautiful serpent in North America." The fantastically colored snake has a broad greenish-yellow stripe on its back bordered by black and red stripes, and a distinctive greenish-blue or bright turquoise-blue belly. Adults can grow to a length of two to three feet. All known populations of this snake occur in San Mateo County near wheehwater marshes, ponds, canals, and slow-moving streams along the coast. The snake's preferred

habitats have been hit hard by agricultural, residential, commercial, and even recreational development. Loss of habitat because of development caused the garter snake to be listed as a federally endangered species in 1967 and a state endangered species in 1971. It feeds on the California red-legged frog and the Pacific tree frog and hibernates in winter. There may be only one to two thousand San Francisco garter snakes remaining in the wild today. One of the last places to see this gorgeous species is at Mori Point in the GGNRA and the adjacent Sharp Park Golf Course.

The state's largest native frog, the California red-legged frog (Rana aurora draytonii) has disappeared from more than 70 percent of its historic range in California. This frog prefers ponds, marshes and creeks with still water. It requires riparian and upland areas with dense vegetation and open areas for cover, aestivation (summertime hibernation), food and basking. Habitat loss to urban development and the effects of introduced predators, such as bullfrogs, are the primary threats to red-legged frogs. It was listed as a federally threatened species in 1996.

#### Sharp Park Financial Drain

Sharp Park's environmental problems are compounded by the fiscal drain the golf course puts on San Francisco's budget. The Recreation and Parks Department estimates indicate that Sharp Park will drain between \$100,000 and \$4,000,000 dollars from San Francisco's coffers between now and 2012. Unfortunately, the lower-loss estimates are achievable only if the City privatizes management and pays employees "lower union wages" - the RPD's sorry euphemism for busting the gardener's union; and convinces a private corporation to invest millions of dollars in capital improvements in the course, presumably by granting the corporation a long-term lease of the property.

This golf bailout plan has its detractors. Harvey Rose, San Francisco's independent budget analyst, has noted that golf rounds played at Sharp Park have declined by almost 40 percent since 2000, and that without massive infrastructure investments Sharp Park cannot increase revenue to the city budget. If fees are raised to pay for the investments, it is very likely that rounds played at Sharp Park will decrease - the primary reason golfers play there today is that course fees are low. The National Golf Foundation - a golf industry group - reported in 2007 that Sharp Park golfers have "very little loyalty" to the course relative to national averages and are "very unsatisfied" with everything from pace of play, on-course services, conditions of golf carts and friendliness of the staff. Any plan to maintain the golf course by squeezing more revenue through "improved" course conditions will not only harm endangered species, but may also bring San Francisco's recreation budget closer to permanent insolvency.

Habitat restoration may prove to be the most fiscally responsible method of managing Sharp Park. While capital investments will be necessary, existing funding sources from private foundations to government agencies that specialize in restoring wetlands have already expressed interest in funding the effort, similar to efforts undertaken at Crissy Field Marsh in the Presidio. The annual operating costs of the restored area would be substantially lower than what San Francisco presently spends on golf course operations.

### Dear Ms. Goldstein:

I have been working diligently with Hadas Rivera-Weiss of HRC to help Stericycle, a medical waste disposal company, to comply with the City's 12B requirements but to no avail. The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) is hosting a oneday eco-fair event, the Big Bluc Bucket event on Saturday, October 11, 2008. The event includes a booth in which San Francisco residents can bring in their old or expired medications for proper disposal. SFPUC is required to dispose of this pharmaceutical waste properly and needs to partner with Stericycle to make this happen. We are requesting that HRC waive the 12B requirements for Stericycle so that SFPUC can ensure its commitment to the SF public and to make this event a success.

There is a state-wide effort, "No Drugs Down the Drain," in which different agencies throughout California are participating in the collection and proper disposal of old or expired medications during the week of October 4-11, 2008. SFPUC is participating by including a booth at their Big Blue Bucket event on October 11, 2008 at the City's Southeast Treatment Plant (750 Phelps Street). Other Bay Area wastewater agencies are also participating. SFPUC has and is continuing to advertise this event throughout San Francisco with Muni bus ads, newspaper advertisements, radio PSAs, SFPUC billing inserts, among other avenues. Thus, SF residents who participate in this event will be expecting to be able to bring their old/expired medications to the event for proper disposal.

I have been working with Hadas Rivera-Weiss on this issue since before September 9, 2008 with corresponding emails and phone conversations. Both Ms. Rivera-Weiss and I have contacted the proper representatives from Stericycle and have not received the proper documentation by the intended deadline.

I have exhausted all other potential vendors. I have asked other participating Bay Area wastewater agencies for recommendations for other vendors, and was told North State Environmental of South San Francisco, CA. After investigation, I found out that North State Environmental is also not compliant with the City's 12B requirements. No other potential vendors were found.

This is an urgent request as the event is upcoming on Saturday, October 11, 2008. It is best if I can submit our order to Stericycle by Friday, September 26, 2008, to ensure that the order is properly processed and that the disposal containers are dropped off prior to the event.

# Italian pet owners face fines on dog mess tests

Dog excrement used to be merely a nuisance to pedestrians, now it could be used as evidence against pet owners and may lead to fines.

A town in northern Italy plans to create a DNA database of all registered dogs and then test droppings le on pavements and in parks to identify the culprit and fine owners who fail to clean up after their pets, La Stampa daily reported Tuesday.

"If signs and invitations aren't enough, we'll try genetics. I want a clean city," Antonio Prencipe, councilo in charge of the environment in Vercelli, a town of some 45,000 inhabitants near Turin, told the paper.

DNA tests would cost around 13 euros (\$19), which would be more than covered by fines, La Stampa said. It did not estimate the cost of creating a database.

The Israeli town of Petah Tikva launched a similar six-month trial program earlier this month, under which dog owners were asked to take their animals to a municipal veterinarian, who then swabs its mouth and collects DNA.

The Coalition for San Francisco Neighborhoods urges the Board of Supervisors to not certify the FEIR for the Eastern Neighborhoods Rezoning and Area Plans because it is inadequate, incomplete, inaccurate, and insufficient. The EIR violates CEQA by failing to identify and mitigate the Project's significant impacts direct and indirect, cumulative impacts on parking, traffic, air quality, historic resources, visual and aesthetic resources, open space, growth, economic segregation, incentive for demolition which will result in cumulative and direct impacts on displacement and blight, impacts on infrastructure, sewage disposal, water, seismic impacts, and others. Several of many examples of the EIR's legal inadequacies are:

1. The historic resource survey has not been completed by the consultants and will not be available to the Planning Department until the end of October or early November. The Planning Department states that in the Mission Area alone there are thousands of properties and that the contract with the consultants will only access 30% of the potentially historic stock in the area, this is unacceptable. The Planning Department will not complete their report on the historic resources until the end of the year or early next year. There may be significant historic resources uncovered and significant changes in zoning will be required. The certification of FEIR of the Eastern Neighborhood Rezoning and Area Plan should not be done until the Planning Department has completed their evaluation and provided a copy to the public.

- 2. The transportation and circulation elements are inadequate and do not correlate with each other. The Planning Department states that the current Muni service in the area is inadequate and that in the future it will be even worst. The Planning Department needs a plan that will address the problem in the future or not allow significant growth that will compound the problem. The cumulative impact on traffic and transit of the Market Octavia Area Plan and Eastern Neighborhood Area Plan has not be analyzed has required by CEQA (sect. 15355). Muni service in Market Octavia today hours is inadequate during the commute hours, with an increase of population of 15,000 by 2025, Muni service will be completely inadequate. The Eastern Neighborhood Zoning and Area Plan could increase population by another 8,000 people, how will Muni provide service in the Market Octavia and Eastern Neighborhoods in the future? The residents of San Francisco will want an answer instead of throwing up the hands in surrender.
- 3. The EIR is also legally inadequate because it does not address the diversity requirements of the households of the city. The 66% of the residents of the City are renters. The housing in the Eastern Neighborhood Rezing and Area Plan does not address the need for more rentals for the expected 8,000 additional residents in the area. To produce mainly 80% market rate housing, 20% affordable housing, and no rental housing is not a plan for San Francisco.

CSFN urges the Board of Supervisors to not certify the FEIR for the Eastern Neighborhoods Zoning and Area Plan, and take action to remand the FEIR back to the Planning Commission for recirculation.





# TITLE 14. Fish and Game Commission Notice of Proposed Changes in Regulations

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fish and Game Commission (Commission), pursuant to the authority vested by sections 200, 202, 205, 210, 215, 220, 702, 7071 and 8587.1 of the Fish and Game Code and to implement, interpret or make specific sections 200, 202, 205, 206, 210, 215, 220, 1802, 7071, 8585.5, and 8586 of the Fish and Game Code; 50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G; 50 CFR 660.384, and Title 14 CCR 27.20, proposes to amend sections 27.20, 27.25, 27.30. 27.35, 27.40, 27.45, 27.50, 27.51, 28.26, 28.27, 28.28, 28.29, 28.48, 28.49, 28.51, 28.52, 28.53, 28.54, 28.55, 28.56, 28.57, and 28.58; and add Section 27.32, Title 14, California Code of Regulations, relating to recreational fishing regulations for federal groundfish and associated species for 2009 and 2010.

#### Informative Digest/Policy Statement Overview

Under California law, the California Fish and Game Commission (Commission) adopts regulations for recreational fishing in state waters zero to three miles from shore. The Pacific Fishery Management Council (Council), consisting of representatives from west coast states, recommends management measures for fisheries operating in federal waters 3 to 200 miles from shore. These management measures are established as federal regulations by NOAA Fisheries Service. For consistency, ease of enforcement, and to avoid confusion on the part of recreational fishermen, the Commission routinely adopts regulations to bring state law into conformance with federal rules for groundfish and other federally-managed species. The proposed changes described in this action would make the requisite changes for the 2009 and 2010 seasons.

There are 90 species of groundfish that occur in state and federal waters off the coast of California, including several species of rockfish, lingcod, cabezon, kelp greenling, California scorpionfish, some flatfish species, and some shark species. These "federal groundfish" species are managed by the Council under the Pacific Coast Federal Groundfish Fishery Management Plan (GFMP) (Magnuson-Stevens Fisheries and Conservation Act 16 U.S.C Section 1851 et seq.).

California sheephead, ocean whitefish and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos* are species that occur almost exclusively within state waters in California and are managed by the Department of Fish and Game (Department). These state-managed species, otherwise identified as "associated species" are known to be caught with federal groundfish species, and thus are regulated in conjunction with federal groundfish.

At its June meeting, the Council adopted new optimum yields for some federal groundfish species along with harvest guidelines for the different fishery sectors for 2009 and 2010. Management measures (e.g., seasons, depth constraints, bag limits) were also decided by the Council to keep within these optimum yields and harvest guidelines for each state and sector. Analysis of past years' catch is used to determine which management measures are expected to keep each fishery sector within its harvest guideline.

Optimum yields set by the Council are based on stock assessments (analyses of current population size), or if a stock assessment is not available, average recent catches are used as a proxy, and are set to maintain healthy stocks. If a stock assessment reveals that the current population size is at or below 25 percent of the unfished biomass (the historic population size), it is considered "overfished". Federal law requires that steps be taken to rebuild overfished stocks

under strict guidelines that place an emphasis on a reasonable likelihood of achieving success within specified time periods.

Currently there are six groundfish species in California that are considered overfished: bocaccio, canary rockfish, cowcod, darkblotched rockfish, widow rockfish, and yelloweye rockfish. Rebuilding plans for each of these species have resulted in the need to set strict harvest guidelines and tailor management to ensure that fishery impacts are minimized. For California's recreational fishery, significant constraints to fishing activities in northern waters will be needed to keep catches of yelloweye rockfish within the allowable harvest guideline for the 2009 and 2010 seasons, similar to 2007 and 2008.

While not designated as "overfished", some federal groundfish species stock assessments show a need to enact more constraining regulations to keep catches within established harvest guidelines, even in the absence of a rebuilding plan. For California's recreational fishery, additional restrictions off central California will be needed to keep catches of blue rockfish within the allowable limit for 2009 and 2010.

It is virtually impossible to target an individual rockfish species, thus fishing for all rockfish has to be restricted to keep within the optimum yield for a constraining species. A "constraining" species is one whose harvest level is low enough that fishing for other co-occurring species becomes limited so that the constraining species' harvest level is not exceeded. Yelloweye rockfish and blue rockfish are considered to be the two most constraining species for California's recreational fishery. Therefore, these species were the primary determinants for the chosen season lengths and depth constraints for fishing for all groundfish and associated species for 2009 and 2010. Canary rockfish, another overfished species, has in the past been a constraining species and could potentially be a constraining species for the central California management areas in 2009 and 2010, which would be addressed in a future rulemaking package if necessary.

Yelloweye rockfish are primarily caught with a mix of other shelf rockfish species north of Point Arena (Mendocino County) in waters deeper than 20 fathoms. For 2009 and 2010, the recreational fishery harvest guideline for yelloweye rockfish will continue to require conservative fishing seasons that may occur only in waters that are 20 fathoms and less in depth.

Blue rockfish is a dominant species in the recreational fishery in California. To stay within the new harvest guideline for this species, it was necessary for the Council to reduce the fishing season length by two weeks in central California.

In order to make the State's regulations consistent with new federal rules that will be established by NOAA Fisheries following the June 2008 Council action, the proposed changes identified in this regulatory package are needed to Title 14 regulations regarding recreational groundfish fishing in State waters. The resulting season structure and depth restrictions adopted by the Council are provided in Table 1. The proposed regulatory changes will affect boat-based anglers only; exceptions for shore-based anglers and divers would remain in effect.

### Modifications to Section 27.25, Northern Groundfish Management Area.

The Department took emergency action in August 2008 (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) to establish a May 1 through September 2 season with a maximum depth restriction of 20 fathoms (120 feet) for groundfish and associated species. Proposed regulations would change the fishing season, for the waters between the Oregon border and the 40° 10' North Latitude management line near Cape Mendocino (Humboldt County), for all groundfish and associated species by modifying the season length to May 15 through September 15. The proposed regulations would also make permanent the maximum depth restriction of 20 fathoms (120 feet) implemented through the emergency action. These changes are necessary to keep yelloweye rockfish catch within the harvest guideline as discussed above.

# Modifications to Section 27.30, North-Central Groundfish Management Area.

The Department took emergency action in August 2008 (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) to split the North-Central Management Area into two distinct regions - the North-Central North of Point Arena Groundfish Management Area, for waters between the 40° 10' North Latitude management line and Point Arena (38° 57.50' North Latitude; Section 27.30, Title 14, CCR), and the North-Central South of Point Arena Groundfish Management Area, for waters between Point Arena and Pigeon Point (San Mateo County; see below; modifications to Section 27.32, Title 14, CCR). Additionally, the emergency action established a maximum depth restriction of 20 fathoms (120 feet) for groundfish and associated species and a June 1 through November 30 season. The proposed regulations would make the 20 fathom maximum depth restriction permanent, and would modify the fishing season to May 15 through August 15. Splitting the North-Central Management Area into two regions would allow for differing regulations north and south of Point Arena, and allow for finer-scale regional management. The take of yelloweye rockfish north of Point Arena is significantly higher than that south of Point Arena.

The August 2008 emergency action (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) removed regulations pertaining to the Farallons Closure Area, the Cordeli Bank Closure Area, and the exception allowing the year-round take of leopard shark in several bays from this section and relocated them to Section 27.32, because these rules do not apply within the re-defined geographic range of this management area. The proposed regulation would make permanent the restructuring of the management areas, with their respective closure areas and leopard shark exception.

# <u>Modifications to Section 27.32, North-Central South of Point Arena Groundfish Management Area.</u>

The Department took emergency action in August 2008 (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) to establish Section 27.32 with regulations pertaining to the waters between Point Arena (Mendocino County) and Pigeon Point (San Mateo County). These regulations include a June 1 through November 30 season for groundfish and associated species, along with a maximum 30 fathom

(180 feet) fishing depth restriction. The proposed regulations would make permanent the 30 fathom maximum depth restrictions, and would modify the fishing season to June 13 through October 31.

The August emergency action (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) removed the regulations pertaining to the Farallones Closure Area, the Cordell Bank Closure Area, and the exception allowing the year-round take of leopard shark in several bays from Section 27.30 and relocated the regulations here without change, because these rules apply within the newly established management area. The proposed regulation would make permanent the restructuring of the management areas, with their respective closure areas and leopard shark exception.

- <u>Modifications to Section 27.35, Monterey South-Central Groundfish Management Area.</u>
   Existing regulations establish a May 1 through November 30 season for groundfish and associated species, with a maximum fishing depth restriction of 40 fathoms (240 feet).
   Proposed regulations would reduce the fishing season for all groundfish and associated species to May 1 through November 15, maintaining the 40 fathom depth restriction. Reducing the season by two weeks is expected to keep blue rockfish catch within the new harvest guideline.
- <u>Modifications to Section 27.40, Morro Bay South-Central Groundfish Management Area.</u>
   Existing regulations establish a May 1 through November 30 season for groundfish and associated species, with a maximum fishing depth restriction of 40 fathoms (240 feet).
   Proposed regulations would reduce the fishing season for all groundfish and associated species to May 1 through November 15, maintaining the 40 fathom depth restriction. Reducing the season by two weeks is expected to help to keep blue rockfish catch within the harvest guideline.
- Modifications to Sections 28.26 California Sheephead; 28.27 Lingcod; 28.28 Cabezon; 28.29 Kelp Greenling. Rock Greenling; 28.48 Pacific Sanddab, Rock Sole, Sand Sole, Butter Sole, Curlfin Sole, Rex Sole and Flathead Sole; 28.49 Dover Sole, English Sole, Petrale Sole, Arrowtooth Flounder, and Starry Flounder; 28.51 Spiny Dogfish, Soupfin Shark; 28.52 Big Skates, California Skates, and Longnose Skates; 28.53 Ratfish, Rattails and Codlings; 28.54 California Scorpionfish (Sculpin); 28.55 Rockfish (Sebastes); 28.56 Leopard Shark; 28.57 Pacific Cod, Pacific Whiting, Sablefish, and Thornyheads; and, 28.58 Ocean Whitefish.
  The listed sections list the seasons and fishing depths for these species or species groups. Additionally, some species or species groups have size limits, bag limits, gear restrictions, exceptions for leopard shark and/or exceptions for "other flatfish". The Department took emergency action in August 2008 (OAL# 2008 0815 04E) to establish seasons and fishing depths for these species or species groups. The proposed regulations would make the changes permanent for each of the sections, and change season dates and/or depth constraints to match the proposed regulations for the different Groundfish Management Areas discussed above.
- <u>Modifications to Section 28.28(b)</u>, <u>Cabezon Bag Limit</u>.
   Existing regulations provide for a one fish bag limit for cabezon within the 10-fish aggregate bag limit for rockfish, cabezon and greenling, the RCG complex. Proposed regulations would increase the cabezon bag limit from one fish to two fish, within the RCG bag limit. The Department analyzed potential impacts of an increase in the recreational cabezon bag limit from one to two fish within the RCG bag limit. Results of the analysis show that an increase in the bag limit is not projected to result in exceeding the recreational harvest guideline for this species. The proposed action could reduce impacts on other fish that would be caught to replace discarded cabezon and decrease waste of discarded dead cabezon.

- Modifications to Section 28.55(b)(1), Bag Limit for Bronzespotted Rockfish.
   Proposed regulations would include the bronzespotted rockfish (Sebastes gilli) as a prohibited rockfish species (no retention, or bag limit of zero). The bronzespotted rockfish is not described as an overfished species because there has not been a formal stock assessment completed; however, anecdotal information suggests its abundance may be low. The proposed change was adopted by the Council as a precautionary measure for 2009 and 2010 to protect bronzespotted rockfish until more information becomes available.
- Modifications to Section 28.55(b)(3), Bag Limit for Bocaccio.
  Existing regulations provide for differing bag limits within the RCG bag limit for bocaccio north and south of the 40° 10' North Latitude management line, with a two fish bag limit in the Northern Management Area, and a one fish bag limit in the remaining management areas, except that there is a zero fish bag limit in the Cowcod Conservation Area. Proposed regulations would allow for a statewide two fish bag limit within the 10 fish RCG bag limit; the zero fish bag limit in the Cowcod Conservation Area would remain unchanged. The coastwide bocaccio optimum yield increased for 2009 and 2010; therefore the statewide recreational fishery can retain two fish while remaining within the bocaccio harvest guideline. The proposed action could reduce impacts on other fish that would be caught to replace discarded bocaccio, decrease waste of discarded dead bocaccio, and allow for the same limit statewide.
- Modifications to Sections 27.25 Northern Groundfish Management Area; 27.30 North-Central Groundfish Management Area; 27.35 Monterey South-Central Groundfish Management Area; 27.40 Morro Bay South-Central Groundfish Management Area; 27.45 Southern Groundfish Management Area; 27.50 Cowcod Conservation Areas; and, Sections 28.48 Pacific Sanddab, Rock Sole, Sand Sole, Butter Sole, Curlfin Sole, Rex Sole and Flathead Sole, Pertaining to the Elimination of Gear Restrictions when Fishing for Sanddabs and Other Flatfish.
  Existing regulations allow Sanddabs and "Other Flatfish" to be taken in the California recreational fishery when fishing for rockfish, lingcod, and associated species is closed and in depths where fishing for rockfish is prohibited, providing that anglers are limited to not more than 12 No. 2 or smaller hooks and up to two pounds of weight. A No. 2 hook means a fishing hook with a gap not greater than 7/16 inch between the hook point and the shank. These regulations were implemented in 2004 to reduce bycatch of overfished rockfish species. The specified gear is the standard gear used for targeting sanddabs regardless of whether the rockfish season is open or closed.

The Department analyzed the merits and shortcomings of the sanddab and "Other Flatfish" gear restrictions. The analysis revealed that there has been no appreciable change to impact rates on overfished species, or any species of the genus *Sebastes*, before and after gear restrictions were implemented and that impacts are presently negligible. Additionally, both California Recreational Fisheries Survey samplers and party/charter boat operators indicated that the bycatch of rockfish species while fishing for sanddabs and "Other Flatfish" is minimal. For regulation simplicity, the Council repealed the aforementioned gear restrictions pertaining to sanddabs and "Other Flatfish". The proposed regulatory changes would conform to action taken by the Council.

<u>Clarifying Changes to Section 27.20(a) Pertaining to the Definition of "Depth Constraint".</u>
 Existing regulations provide the definition of depth constraint as based on either general depth contour lines or a set of federal waypoints. Proposed regulations would clarify that the Department uses two different definitions of "depth constraint" depending on whether fishing is

occurring in waters greater than or equal to 30 fathoms or waters that are shallower than 30 fathoms. Areas equal to or deeper than 30 fathoms shall use a line determined by connecting the appropriate set of waypoints adopted in Federal regulations, and areas shallower than 30 fathoms shall use general depth contour lines for approximating depth at which the angler is fishing.

• Clarifying Changes to Section 27.20(b) Pertaining to Special Closure Areas.

The Department took emergency action in May 2008 (OAL# 2008 0505 01E) to clarify that unless there is a special exemption, the take of groundfish and associated species is prohibited in special closure areas (e.g., Cordell Banks closure) even when the rest of the management area is open. This emergency action will expire November 5, 2008; however, the proposed regulation would make the change permanent.

• Clarifying changes to Section 28.56 Leopard Shark.

Current regulations allow for the take of leopard shark in waters 20 fathoms or less from March through December within the Cowcod Conservation Area. This is contrary to Section 28.50 Cowcod Conservation Area which does not allow for the take of leopard shark within the Cowcod Conservation Area. Currently, there are exceptions allowing the take of leopard shark in enclosed bays; however, there are no enclosed bays within the Cowcod Conservation Area and there was never any intent to allow fishing for leopard sharks within the Cowcod Conservation Area. The proposed regulation would remove this inconsistency by prohibiting the take of leopard shark within the Cowcod Conservation Area.

#### Availability of Modified Text

If the regulations adopted by the Commission differ from but are sufficiently related to the action proposed, they will be available to the public for at least 15 days prior to the date of adoption. Circumstances beyond the control of the Commission (e.g., timing of Federal regulation adoption, timing of resource data collection, timelines do not allow, etc.) or changes made to be responsive to public recommendation and comments during the regulatory process may preclude full compliance with the 15-day comment period, and the Commission will exercise its powers under Section 202 of the Fish and Game Code. Regulations adopted pursuant to this section are not subject to the time periods for adoption, amendment or repeal of regulations prescribed in sections 11343.4, 11346.4 and 11346.8 of the Government Code. If the regulatory proposal is adopted, the final statement of reasons may be obtained from the address above when it has been received from the agency program staff.

### Impact of Regulatory Action

The potential for significant statewide adverse economic impacts that might result from the proposed regulatory action has been assessed, and the following initial determinations relative to the required statutory categories have been made:

(a) Significant Statewide Adverse Economic Impact Directly Affecting Business, Including the Ability of California Businesses to Compete with Businesses in Other States:

The range of proposed management actions that would limit recreational groundfish fishing in one or more of the Groundfish Management Areas for one or more species of fish may have adverse impacts to some businesses in California. Sport fishing business owners, boat owners, tackle store owners, boat manufacturers, vendors of food, bait, fuel and lodging, and others that provide goods or services to those that recreationally pursue groundfish off California may be adversely affected to some degree from loss of business if the 2009 and 2010 seasons are restricted compared to previous management cycles. However, anticipated impacts are speculative and would vary considerably by geographic location and by the nature and extent of the regulatory action taken. Additionally, it should be noted that the proposed regulatory actions would not apply to those recreationally targeting groundfish from shore or by diving, which would lessen impacts to some businesses such as dive and kayak shops.

Furthermore, while some coastal areas rely more heavily on boat-based sport groundfish fishing activity, there are other areas in which it comprises only a small amount of the overall fishing effort. For 2007, the Department estimates that recreational anglers in ocean waters throughout California made about 3.7 million fishing trips. It is not possible to approximate how many of these trips would not be taken exclusively as a result of the proposed regulatory action. It is important to recognize that in all coastal areas of California there is still recreational ocean fishing opportunity for other desirable target species that are not managed as part of the groundfish complex - namely albacore,

halibut, surf perches, bass, and others. Fishing opportunities for these species would not be impacted by the proposed regulation changes. When recreational anglers are prohibited or curtailed from targeting one particular species or groups of species due to season or area closures, oftentimes they will mitigate by changing target species or relocating their effort.

The Commission has made an initial determination that the amendment of this regulation may have a significant statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states. The Commission has considered proposed alternatives that would lessen any adverse economic impact on business and invites you to submit proposals. Submissions may include the following considerations:

- (i) the establishment of differing compliance or reporting requirements or timetables which take into account the resources available to businesses;
- (ii) consolidation or simplification of compliance and reporting requirements for businesses;
- (iii) the use of performance standards rather than prescriptive standards; or
- (iv) exemption or partial exemption from the regulatory requirements for business.
- (b) Impact on the Creation or Elimination of Jobs within the State, the Creation of New Businesses or the Elimination of Existing Businesses, or the Expansion of Businesses in California:

The proposed regulatory action could produce some impact on the creation or elimination of jobs or businesses that rely on recreational fishing for groundfish and associated species. However, the degree of impact is highly speculative in nature and cannot be quantified. See response to (a) above.

(c) Cost Impacts on a Representative Private Person or Business:

The Commission is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

- (d) Costs or Savings to State Agencies or Costs/Savings in Federal Funding to the State: None.
- (e) Nondiscretionary Costs/Savings to Local Agencies: None.
- (f) Programs Mandated on Local Agencies or School Districts: None.
- (g) Costs Imposed on any Local Agency or School District that is Required to be Reimbursed Under Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4: None.
- (h) Effect on Housing Costs: None.

#### Effect on Small Business

It has been determined that the adoption of these regulations may affect small business. The Commission has drafted the regulations in Plain English pursuant to Government Code sections 11342.580 and 11346.2(a)(1).


#### Consideration of Alternatives

In response to your inquiry of 9/9/2008 at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors, made to the District Attorney, City Attorney, Mayor's Office, and All City Departments, regarding violence prevention efforts in the Mission; the Department on the Status of Women shares your concerns regarding the necessity for increased and improved coordination of violence prevention efforts in the district.

The Department on the Status of Women is closely involved in many violence prevention and intervention efforts that impact the Mission. These efforts include:

- Our Violence Against Women Prevention and Intervention Grants Program gives
  financial support to organizations and programs that work to prevent violence against
  women and girls, as well as providing support to those who have become victims of
  sexual assault and intimate partner violence. These organizations include Mission
  Neighborhood Centers, Horizons, Mujeres Unidas y Activas, Riley Center, La Casa
  de las Madres, WOMAN Inc., San Francisco Women Against Rape, and the
  Cooperative Restraining Order Clinic, all of which provide services in the Mission
  District.
- The Family Violence Council addresses violence throughout the lifespan, including child abuse, domestic violence, and elder/dependent adult abuse. Quarterly meetings afford these communities an opportunity to exchange information and lay the groundwork for new collaborative efforts on cross-cutting issues such as language access, enhancing prosecutions, and follow-up to the Attorney General's Report on Domestic Violence. The Family Violence Council has 3 primary goals: to coordinate services and improve communication between the three communities; to analyze trends and data related to family violence in San Francisco, statewide, and nationally; and to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Courts about these trends and other family violence-related issues. Active members include the Office of the District Attorney, the Police Department, the Superior Court, Adult Probation, the Department of Public Health, the Human Services Agency, and San Francisco Unified School District.

• The Justice & Courage Oversight Panel, which seeks to end domestic violence by creating a seamless and well-coordinated system-wide response to intimate partner violence in San Francisco. Currently the Oversight Panel is working with Police, Adult Probation, community service providers, the Sheriff's Department, and others to address 1. Language access for limited English-speaking proficient victims of domestic violence; 2. Policies to identify and address stalking, 3. Improved batterer accountability, 4. The system's inability to identify the complexity of risk that victims face depending on their background, and 5. The system's inability to assess the degree of danger that a victim faces.

In addition to the above programs, the Department on the Status of Women was involved in the development of the City-wide Violence Prevention Plan that was released earlier this year. Implementation of this plan should make a difference in the City's response to violence when it occurs, as well as making a long-term investment in the prevention of violence through improved services and efforts to keep people safe.
