WHEREAS, Lesbian and gay individuals and their family members do not enjoy the same legal recognition, rights, and protections as their heterosexual counterparts; and,

WHEREAS, One such example of this includes the inability to legally marry, which denies lesbian and gay individuals access to some 161 state and federal benefits; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco has long-established policies and procedures supporting and affirming lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals and their right to register for and receive domestic partnership benefits; and,

WHEREAS, The issue of legalizing gay marriage has been and will continue to be litigated in courts across the country, and,

WHEREAS, In response to a legal challenge by three same-sex couples, the Vermont Supreme Court's ruled on December 20, 1999 that the state of Vermont is constitutionally required to extend to same-sex couples the common benefits and protections that flow from marriage under Vermont law; and,

WHEREAS, The court's decision further asserted that that denying same-sex couples access to the same rights and responsibilities as heterosexual married couples is discriminatory; and,

WHEREAS, This court also directed the state legislature to either legalize gay marriages or to decide how to bestow all of the previously denied rights and privileges of marriages to same sex couples,
