[Citywide Longer Pedestrian Crossing Time]

RESOLUTION URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKING AND TRAFFIC TO EXPAND ITS

SIGNAL RE-TIMING PROGRAMS IN THE GEARY BOULEVARD, VAN NESS AVENUE,

19TH AVENUE, AND NORTH OF MARKET AREA BY IMPLEMENTING TRAFFIC SIGNAL

TIMINGS USING A PEDESTRIAN WALKING SPEED OF 2.5 FEET PER SECOND CURB
TO-CURB ON A CITYWIDE BASIS AND REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKING

AND TRAFFIC TO SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ON THE

STATUS OF THIS IMPLEMENTATION EVERY SIX MONTHS.

WHEREAS, On May 17, 1999, the Board of Supervisors approved Resolution #99-0939 urging the Department of Parking and Traffic to begin implementing traffic signal timings of 2.5 feet per second curb-to-curb to allow pedestrians more time to cross the street; and,

WHEREAS, Since that time, the Department of Parking and Traffic has implemented a signal re-timing pilot program along Geary Boulevard to 2.5 feet per second and is currently beginning programs along Van Ness Avenue, 19th Avenue and in the North of Market area; and,

WHEREAS, Signal re-timings to allow pedestrians more time to cross the street are especially necessary given that a report recently released by the Surface Transportation Policy Project, a national organization in Washington, D.C., named San Francisco the county with the highest incidence of pedestrian fatalities and injuries in the state of California; and,

SUPERVISOR, TENG, LENO, BECERRIL, BIERMAN, KATZ, BROWN BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

WHEREAS, Young children, elderly, and disabled pedestrians are especially vulnerable when crossing streets because of reduced mobility; and,

WHEREAS, The national standard for safely timing pedestrian crossings controlled by a traffic signal is four feet per second; and

WHEREAS, While the Department of Parking and Traffic fully complies with this standard, many seniors and disabled persons require a slower walking speed of 2.5 feet per second to safely cross the street; and,

WHEREAS, The use of this walking speed of 2.5 feet per second must be evaluated within the parameters of the City's Congestion

Management Program and the California Environmental Quality Act; and

WHEREAS, One way to possibly overcome the congestion impacts of re-timing traffic signals to a 2.5 feet per second walking speed is to do a system-wide re-timing of the traffic signals to increase the "cycle length" of the signal system; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby urges the Department of Parking and Traffic to expand its signal re-timing programs in the Geary Boulevard, Van Ness Avenue, 19th Avenue, and North of Market area by implementing traffic signal timings using a pedestrian walking speed of 2.5 feet per second curb-to-curb on a citywide basis; and be it,

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Department of Parking and Traffic is requested to submit a report to the Board of Supervisors on the status of this implementation every six months.
