WHEREAS, Approximately 96 percent of those convicted for crack possession are Latino or African American; and,

WHEREAS, The United States incarcerates more citizens per capita than any other democracy in the world with the largest number of prisoners sentenced for crimes involving drugs or resulting from their dependence on drugs; and,

WHEREAS, With prison cells costing approximately \$20,000 per year, the State of California spends more tax dollars on prisons than it does on public schools; and,

WHEREAS, The National Coalition for Effective Drug Policy has called for an evaluation of our national, state, and local government policies by examining the racial sentencing disparities of those who are incarcerated and those who are placed in drug rehabilitation; and.
