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OPPOSING CALIFORNIA ASSEMBLY BILL 2809 (ROBERT PACHECO) (AB "2809"), WHICH WOULD MAKE ROUTINE THE HIV TESTING OF PREGNANT WOMEN.

WHEREAS, Current law requires that physicians offer HIV information, counseling and testing to all prenatal patients; and

WHEREAS, AB 2809 seeks to (1) modify these provisions, (2) make routine the HIV testing of pregnant women in California, (3) make such testing information available to the State Department of Health Services; and (4) waive for pregnant women the requirement that a patient's written consent to HIV testing must be obtained; and

WHEREAS, The effectiveness of current law, as evidenced by positive public health outcomes in the area of perinatal HIV transmission, makes AB 2809 unnecessary and poor public health policy; and

WHEREAS, Perinatal AIDS cases in California dropped 89% between 1993 and 1999; and

WHEREAS, Five, out of an estimated 520,000, live births were diagnosed with perinatally acquired AIDS in California in 1999; and

WHEREAS, The California State Office of AIDS conducted a study which found that nearly all prenatal care providers surveyed (98.4%) routinely offer prenatal HIV testing to their patients; and

WHEREAS, Though AB 2809 provides that a woman may refuse HIV testing after receiving information and counseling, by adding the test to the multitude of those routinely performed on blood samples of pregnant women, by excluding any explicit requirement that a woman be informed of her

right of refusal, and by removing the requirement that her written consent be obtained, a woman's right to informed consent would be severely compromised; and

WHEREAS, The failure to provide for informed consent reduces the degree of information and autonomy afforded pregnant and delivering women and diminishes the rights of women over their reproductive decisions; and

WHEREAS, Excluding pregnant women from informed consent requirements raises concerns of gender discrimination and invasion of privacy; and

WHEREAS, Routine testing for HIV may discourage pregnant women from receiving prenatal care; and

WHEREAS, Women who are engaged as active participants in their health care decisions relating to HIV and are offered the option of voluntary HIV testing agree to be tested at very high rates; and

WHEREAS, In a study of over 32,400 pregnant women conducted by Kaiser Permanente Hospitals in California, 90% of pregnant women who received counseling and educational materials voluntarily consented to be tested; and

WHEREAS, Names based reporting has been shown to be a disincentive to testing and early treatment for individuals most at-risk for HIV infection; and

WHEREAS, AB 2809 requires the reporting to the State Department of Health Services of, among other things, information related to a woman's HIV test; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has consistently supported the reporting of HIV by unique identifier and opposed the reporting of HIV by name; and
