URGING THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO THROUGH THE PEDESTRIAN SAFETY INTERDEPARTMENTAL WORKING GROUP TO TAKE IMMEDIATE ACTION ON THE TOP TEN PROPOSALS GENERATED BY SAN FRANCISCO'S FIRST-EVER PEDESTRIAN SAFETY SUMMIT.

WHEREAS, On May 26, 2000, San Francisco hosted its first-ever Pedestrian Safety Summit at the Hiram Johnson State Office Building Auditorium located at 455 Golden Gate Avenue; and,

WHEREAS, The Pedestrian Safety Summit was convened by Supervisor Mabel Teng with the co-sponsorship of Assembly Majority Leader Kevin Shelley and Mayor Willie L. Brown, Jr. with the support of the full Board of Supervisors and the participation of the San Francisco Police Department, the Department of Parking and Traffic, the Department of Public Health, MUNI, the District Attorney's Office, Caltrans, and the Transportation Authority; and,

WHEREAS, The Pedestrian Safety Summit brought together these City officials and staff with advocates representing BayPeds, Walk SF, Senior Action Network, the San Francisco Bicycle Coalition, the Pedestrian Safety Task Force, and the San Francisco Parent Teacher Association, as well as neighborhood activists, residents, and the entire San Francisco community to begin developing a comprehensive plan of action for pedestrian safety; and,

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WHEREAS, More than 200 people attended the Pedestrian Safety 1 Summit generating 105 ideas to make San Francisco a more liveable, 2 more walkable, and more pedestrian-friendly City; and 3 WHEREAS, At least ten of these ideas have the full support of 4 all groups and departments involved in the Pedestrian Safety Summit 5 report; and, 6 7 WHEREAS, These ten proposals are: 1. Begin a grassroots Citywide advertising campaign for 8 pedestrian safety that targets pedestrians, drivers, and 9 cyclists. 10 2. Establish a 24-hour hotline for individuals to report 11 dangerous intersections and have staff dedicated to 12 investigating these reports. 13 3. Increase crossing time on our busiest streets from the 14 national walking rate standard of 4.0 feet per second to 2.5 15 feet per second. 16 4. Install "all red" signals to give pedestrians a head start 17 when crossing the street. 18 5. Commission a study on the rate of accidents caused by drivers 19 using cell phones. 20 6. Install pedestrian countdown clocks so that pedestrians know 21 exactly how much time is left to cross the street. 22 7. Install "lighted crosswalks" that are activated when a 23 pedestrian steps into the crosswalk. 24 25

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- 8. Replace dull yellow signs with high-visibility fluorescent yellow-green "School Crossing" and "Senior Crossing" signs at all intersections surrounding schools and senior centers and install high-visibility fluorescent yellow-green "Pedestrian Crossing" signs at all uncontrolled intersections with crosswalks.
 - 9. Install more traffic calming measures such as speed humps and bulb outs in residential neighborhoods which have become "cutthroughs" for commuters.
- 10.Fully fund a study of Market Street to devise a plan for improvements to increase the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists and provide for better transit access; now therefore be it,

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby urges the City and County of San Francisco through the Pedestrian Safety Interdepartmental Working Group to take immediate action on the top ten proposals generated by San Francisco's first-ever Pedestrian Safety Summit.
