

1 **[Commending the African American Tobacco Free Project and the Fabulous Forty for**  
2 **their work on tobacco control]**

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4 **Resolution commending the San Francisco African American Tobacco Free Project**  
5 **(SFAATFP) and the forty African American religious institutions representing Bay Area**  
6 **churches, temples, and mosques (hereinafter referred to as the "Fabulous Forty"), for**  
7 **their endless effort to free their community from the deadly grasp of nicotine addiction,**  
8 **and their decision not to accept any funding from tobacco companies.**

10 WHEREAS, tobacco-related deaths continue to be the number one cause for African  
11 Americans, claiming 40,000 lives a year; and

12 WHEREAS, tobacco-related deaths claim more lives than violence, AIDS, car  
13 accidents, and (non-tobacco-related) cancer COMBINED; and,

14 WHEREAS, the Tobacco Industry continues to spend million of dollars annually on  
15 advertising that specifically targets the African American community; and,

16 WHEREAS, the Tobacco Industry seeks to legitimize the death and destruction it reeks  
17 on our community by sponsoring church activities, cultural events, scholarships, and other  
18 self-serving philanthropic causes. This sponsorship and funding buys silence in communities  
19 of color who disproportionately share death and disability from tobacco products; and,

20 WHEREAS, in 1994, over 4,000 pages of secret documents were unfolded in  
21 Congress, proving that as early as 1950 the Tobacco Industry knew that smoking (tobacco)  
22 caused cancer and that "nicotine was addictive"; and,

23 WHEREAS, the Tobacco Industry spends over \$638 million of dollars per year  
24 advertising tobacco products; and,

25 WHEREAS, Secondhand smoke triggers asthma in children, and African American

1 children suffer from a disproportionately high rate of asthma; and,

2 WHEREAS, every cigarette smoked has more than 4,000 chemicals. These same  
3 chemicals are found in car exhaust, nail polish, window cleaners; and,

4 WHEREAS, 29.6 million cigarettes, are illegally sold to youth in California each year;  
5 and,

6 WHEREAS, each year, 106,000 children under the age of 18 become daily smokers;  
7 now, therefore be it

8 RESOLVED, That City and County of San Francisco commends the San Francisco  
9 African American Tobacco Free Project (SFAATFP) and the Fabulous Forty, for their endless  
10 efforts to free their community from the deadly grasp of nicotine addiction by supporting  
11 tobacco control activities, adopting smoke-free policies, and continuing to be a force against  
12 the Tobacco Industry.

13 FURTHER RESOLVED, That City and County of San Francisco pledges to work with  
14 the San Francisco African American Tobacco Free Project (SFAATFP) and the "Fabulous  
15 Forty", to safeguard the interests of all San Franciscans from the Tobacco Industry by  
16 maintaining adequate funding levels for tobacco control activities, continuing to view tobacco  
17 as a global issue, and continuing to enact and enforce comprehensive tobacco control  
18 measures.




