Resolution Authorizing the Department of Public Health, Community Behavioral Health Services to retroactively accept a gift of Buprenorphine medication from Reckitt Benckiser Pharmaceuticals with an estimated monetary value of up to \$300,000 for the period of January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2009 to expand Opiate Replacement Therapy services in San Francisco.

WHEREAS, Resolution 770-02 authorized the Department of Public Health to establish an opiate treatment services funded by a grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration; and

WHEREAS, one of the projects funded by the grant was the pilot program for the Office–Based Opiate Addiction Treatment (OBOT) which expanded access to methadone and buprenorphine by planning the program in close proximity to clients homes and by providing funding for the purchase of a quantity of buprenorphine; and

WHEREAS, methadone and buprenorphine are two treatments that have been shown to be effective in treatment of opiate addiction, and buprenorphine can be distributed in an office setting by a certified physician while methadone is typically distributed in a clinic-based setting; and

WHEREAS, buprenorphine has been shown to be as effective as methadone, and appears to have fewer side effects, a greater margin of safety if taken in overdose, and a lower potential for abuse than methadone; and

WHEREAS, the Department enrolled the first buprenorphine patient in 2003 and over 120 total patients have since enrolled in the OBOT Pilot project and the Integrated Buprenorphine Intervention Services and program evaluation data reveals high retention in treatment, significant reductions in opiate (heroin) use, and extremely high patient satisfaction; and

WHEREAS, the grant that funded the cost of the buprenorphine is almost exhausted and Reckitt Benckiser Pharmaceuticals, the maker of buprenorphine, has agreed to provide the medication to up to 100 patients for up to a one year period for each patient free of charge; and

WHEREAS, in return for the medication, DPH agrees to share the outcome information and continue to present data for research on treatment of opiate addiction locally and at national scientific/treatment conferences; and

WHEREAS, DPH wishes to obtain approval from the Health Commission and the Board of Supervisors to accept the donation of the buprenorphine medication; and now, therefore; be it

RESOLVED, that the Department of Public Health, Community Behavioral Health Service is hereby authorized to accept this gift in accordance with the requirements set

forth pursuant to San Francisco Administrative Code Section 10.100-305, and Code Section 10.100-201; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Department of Public Health, Community Behavioral Health Services is hereby authorized to retroactively accept a gift of Buprenorphine medication from Reckitt Benckiser Pharmaceuticals with an estimated monetary value of up to \$300,000 for the period of January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2009.
