[Resolution declaring October 11, 2007 as Eleanor Roosevelt Day]

WHEREAS, Eleanor Roosevelt was born in New York on October 11, 1884 and became one of the most admired figures of the 20th Century, according to people's polls year after year; and,

WHEREAS, Eleanor Roosevelt was a lifelong prolific communicator, writing a daily newspaper column *My Day*, monthly magazine articles with titles alone that fill 33 pages, numerous books, broadcasting a weekly radio program, and holding regular press conferences in the White House with the women's press corps while First Lady; and,

WHEREAS, She encouraged responses from the public, resulting in the receipt of hundreds of thousands of letters still on file at Hyde Park; and,

WHEREAS, Throughout her husband's presidency Eleanor Roosevelt acted as his legs, eyes and ears to report back on the pulse, conditions and unmet needs of the American people, thus helping to design and implement the programs of the New Deal; and,

WHEREAS, Eleanor Roosevelt was a pragmatic humanitarian, promoting democracy and the public good, advocating and actively supporting individual, economic, civil and political rights, without discrimination, particularly of low-income women and people of color; and,

WHEREAS, In 1927 Eleanor Roosevelt hosted a meeting of 400 women to organize a women's peace movement and support the Kellogg-Briand Pact to outlaw war and persisted as one of the most prominent antiwar women in the United States; and, be it

WHEREAS, Eleanor Roosevelt was an intrepid traveler, whether as goodwill ambassador or reporter, visiting with world leaders as well as seeking out ordinary folks all

over the world, including during World War I and World War II to speak to the troops and visit the wounded; and,

WHEREAS, Eleanor Roosevelt was a delegate for 10 years to the General Assembly of the United Nations; and,

WHEREAS, While Chair of the Human Rights Committee of the United Nations, Eleanor Roosevelt facilitated the writing of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which after over two years of unceasing work was finally passed by the General Assembly on December 10, 1948, and which she referred to as "my most important task," and which today remains the cornerstone of the human rights movement around the world; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That October 11, 2007 be designated by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors as Eleanor Roosevelt Day in San Francisco
