Resolution declaring November 10, 2007 as Eddie Fung Day in San Francisco

WHEREAS, Eddie Fung, was born in 1922 to Chinese immigrants in Chinatown, San Francisco, and was the seventh child in a family of four boys and four girls; and

WHEREAS, Eddie Fung became a Texas cowboy at sixteen, and volunteered for the Texas National Guard in 1940; and

WHEREAS, Eddie Fung's battalion was called to the Pacific and was the only Chinese American soldier among captives of the Japanese in the battle for Java in World War II, spending the next forty-two months as a prisoner of war building the Burma-Siam Railroad track through 262 miles of tropical jungle under brutal labor conditions, completing the railroad in fourteen months at a cost of 16,000 POWs and 70,000 Asian lives; and

WHEREAS, Eddie Fung survived to share his remarkable tale in *The Adventures of Eddie Fung, Chinatown Kid, Texas Cowboy, Prisoner of War,* edited by Judy Yung and published by University of Washington Press, November, 2007; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco commends a courageous San Francisco Native, Eddie Fung, for his lifelong courage and dedicated service upon the publication of his memoir and hereby declares November 10, 2007, Eddie Fung Day in San Francisco.
