WHEREAS, A multiracial group of activists founded the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) on February 12th, 1909; and

WHEREAS, For one hundred years, the NAACP has been in the forefront of civil rights advocacy and has earned its place in American history as the single most important civil rights organization in the nation; and,

WHEREAS, The NAACP has successfully lobbied for changes in politics, employment, education, public accommodations, health and housing and has helped pave for the way for the continued advancement of racial equality; and,

WHEREAS, In 1982, the San Francisco chapter of the NAACP filed a lawsuit against the San Francisco Unified School District, which led the SFUSD to revise their admission policies in an attempt to reduce racial segregation and close the achievement gap between different racial populations; and,

WHEREAS, In 2008, the NAACP selected Benjamin Todd Jealous as their new president; and,

WHEREAS, Benjamin Todd Jealous is a Northern California native who was previously president of the Rosenberg Foundation, a San Francisco-based civil and human rights advocacy organization; and,

WHEREAS, By selecting Benjamin Todd Jealous, age thirty-five, as their president, the NAACP has shown a commitment to engaging younger generations in their ongoing and evolving work to ensure political, educational, social, and economic equality for all citizens; and,

WHEREAS, In 2005, the NAACP began the Leadership 500 Summit, which has trained more than 1,200 mid-level professionals between the ages of 30 and 50 on issues of economic parity, health and wellness as a business imperative, and early childhood education; and,

WHEREAS, In this year when our country celebrated the inauguration of Barack Obama, our first African American president, it is fitting to recognize the work the NAACP has accomplished in reducing institutional racism and promoting racial tolerance that helped make President Obama's landmark election possible; now, therefore, be it,

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco commends the NAACP on their centennial anniversary for their invaluable contributions to the betterment of American society and wishes them continued success in their second century.
